WHAT

IS CANINE TRAINING ALL ABOUT?

Canine trainers use operant conditioning to modify the behavior of dogs, increasing the frequency of preferred behaviors and eliminating those that are undesirable. Trainers can prepare dogs for a host of specialized activities such as agility competitions, search and rescue, service work, or animal assisted therapy. Alternatively, trainers may work with owners to help them resolve behavioral issues or to train entirely new behaviors. Training can greatly improve the quality of life for both dog and owner, strengthening the bond between them. All trainers need to have a detailed knowledge of canine behavior, but they also need a variety of techniques that can be used to modify those behaviors. At the Animal Behavior Institute, we take a very comprehensive approach to canine training. In addition to training, we include canine behavior, communication, enrichment, nutrition and health. Our broad-based approach provides you with an extensive understanding of canine training and behavior.

We offer four certificate programs in canine training at the Animal Behavior Institute:

- **Canine Training & Behavior** (3 courses)
- **Advanced Canine Training** (5 courses)
- **Service & Therapy Dog Training** (5 courses)
- **Canine Sports Training** (5 courses)

Canine Training & Behavior is a shorter, specialized program covering the essentials of training. The program also incorporates problem solving, behavioral development, and body language.

Advanced Canine Training expands upon the foundation established in Canine Training & Behavior. You'll take an advanced canine training course as well as an elective of your choice. The program incorporates advanced principles of behavioral science to develop more complex training programs.

Service & Therapy Dog Training teaches you how to train dogs for various forms of assistance, with an emphasis on service training and animal assisted therapy, including the training of specific assistance tasks.

Canine Sports Training is for owners and trainers that want to train their canine athletes to excel in sports competitions, such as agility, obedience rallies, and the host of new canine sports that have recently become available. The nosework component of the program includes training for scent detection, discrimination, and tracking.

WORKS WITH CANINE BEHAVIOR?

Who hires dog trainers and behaviorists? They may be self-employed as trainers or behavioral consultants. Dog trainers may also work for veterinarians, the pet industry, animal shelters, kennels, animal control and the retail pet trade. Trainers may ultimately work with seeing eye or assistance dogs, show dogs, hunting dogs, personal protection dogs, or dogs in any number of specialized training programs. Sample positions include:

The outlook for professionals in animal care and service, including animal trainers, is very positive. Employment in these areas is expected to grow 15 percent over the next decade, faster than the average for all occupations*. Salaries vary greatly based on the specific field or employer. For example, independent dog trainers may work for \$25-50/hour or more; opportunities in training have never been greater. Advanced Canine Training

The Advanced Canine Training certificate requires the completion of the three required courses in Canine Training & Behavior plus two additional courses (one required, one elective), for a total of five courses.

Field Requirement

We believe that academic training must be accompanied by real world experience to be truly effective. During your time as a student, you will complete a field requirement consisting of 40 hours of hands-on experience as an employee, intern or volunteer at an approved institution of your choice. Note that students only need to do one field requirement even if they complete multiple canine certificates.

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FACULTY SPOTLIGHT

DR. LINDSAY MEHRKAM Professor of Canine Training & Behavior



Dr. Mehrkam received her Ph.D. in Psychology with a specialization in Behavior Analysis from the University of Florida. She has worked with a wide range of spe-

cies in numerous animal facilities including Disney's Animal Kingdom, Busch Gardens, Mote Marine Laboratory, Wolf Park, and the Santa Fe College Teaching Zoo.

Her primary research interests focus on the benefits of human-animal interaction, enrichment, and training for improving the welfare of captive animals, and especially canines. As a Board-Certified Behavior Analyst, she also provides in-home consultations with both animals and people. Dr. Mehrkam studies applications of the human-animal bond for improving the lives of children with intellectual, developmental, and emotional disabilities. Her research has been published in the Journal of Applied Animal Welfare Science and Applied Animal Behaviour Science; she has presented at numerous scientific conferences. Dr. Mehrkam has taught at both the University of Florida and the Santa Fe College Teaching Zoo. She is currently a faculty member at Monmouth University.

CHERIE ANDERSON BEATTIE Professor of Canine Training & Behavior



Professor Beattie received her certification from the Certification Council for Professional Dog Trainers while working as the Behavior Manager at the Kentucky Humane Soci-

ety. There she established a new dog training program to make shelter dogs more adoptable. She currently runs her own dog training business, teaches as an online instructor for the University of Louisville, and serves as a committee member of the Association of Pet Dog Trainers. She regularly contributes articles on dog behavior to several professional newsletters and magazines. Professor Beattie also works in animal assisted activities and teaches a specialized course, offered exclusively at the Animal Behavior Institute, entitled "Training Your Therapy Dog".
